Why not find the topic you're doing on www.bbc.co.uk/ schools/bitesize or have a go at a revision game online




Idea 6 You could head to Graves Park to look at the animals. if you don't mind the



In the near future, we should be starting work with students doing some project work on energy and hopefully arranging video conferencing between students.

Ahmed and Abeer then travelled to Sheffield with me. I took them for a trip around Castleton and Bakewell to show them the beauty of the Peak District. We also had a guided tour of the new mosque on Wolseley Road and visited the Winter Gardens and Peace Gardens. They also spent two days in school observing lessons and speaking to staff and students. They were extremely impressed with our school and especially our students. I look forward to the next stage in the partnership when students can become more involved and start finding out about life as a young person in the Middle East.

## Sri Lankan partner school welcomes Meadowhead visitors in style!




In late November 2007 Miss Allen and Mr Quibell went on a week's visit to one of our partner schools - Welithara Muslim College - Balapitiya in Sri Lanka. Our aim was to consolidate and develop our global schools partner links with this small Muslim school in the South West of Sri Lanka. Our host Mrs Nilanthi Waidyaratne (an English teacher at the school) had earlier in the year visited Meadowhead and indeed had observed one of Mr Quibell's Year 7 Humanities classes, attended assemblies and other humanities lessons for all ages. Having thoroughly enjoyed her week's experience at Meadowhead Mrs Waidyaratne was determined to give us both a genuine insight into the workings of her school and a broad taste of the rich Sri Lankan culture. We were not disappointed.

The school itself we found was a collection of roughly three single-storey, stand-alone teaching blocks furnished with simple wooden exam style desks, chairs and blackboards. There was an unfinished double-storey teaching block to the rear, which bordered onto a small school playing field, which was also home to the odd cow belonging to neighbouring households! Some of the older students are responsible for maintaining the playing fields and trees and keeping the plants tidy and watered. They don't have cleaners or caretakers here.

The school's computer room and science lab were bare of much of even the most basic equipment (particularly the latter), and we might have perhaps been embarrassed and saddened were we not taken up in the uplifting spirit of the school. Everywhere we looked we saw happy,





proud, outgoing and optimistic pupils from years 5 to 11 resplendent in their whiter than white uniforms, eager to learn and prosper. The atmosphere of the school was relaxed and sedate – the teaching itself appeared to be "old school" talk and chalk, with essentials like exercise books and good textbooks being in obvious short supply. This was obviously a poor school in a poor developing country but it felt and it appeared to be a very good school despite its difficult circumstances.

Highlights of the visit to our Sri Lankan partner school included:

- The whole school welcoming us on arrival with a traditional Sri Lankan dance.
   (Mr Quibell being adorned with a beautiful flower garland!)
- Giving out a present of a Meadowhead "friends around the world" pen to each and every pupil courtesy of money raised at Meadowhead through enterprise.
- Planting a new tree to mark the link between Meadowhead and Welithara.
- Mr Quibell and Miss Allen using Thinking

- Skills to teach a lesson about Buddha's 4 sights to a very eager mixed age class.
- Miss Allen being surrounded by an entourage of Year 8 girls fascinated by her freshly painted nails!
- Over 10 new computers arriving to fill up a rather forlorn computer room.
- Meeting pupils such as Faslan and Amsal

   real ambassadors for their country and generation.

When out of school we were lucky enough to experience riding in the traditional Tuk-tuk taxi, visits to a tea plantation, Buddhist temples, and unforgettable visits to a turtle sanctuary and elephant orphanage – making this truly a trip of a lifetime.

We hope and plan that as a result of this visit both staff and pupils will further benefit from this valuable global school link. In the medium-term this





could mean mutual video-conferencing opportunities, and certainly more varied lessons and visits of staff and pupils between our two schools to encourage global citizenship. Whatever happens - the future's brighter for both of our schools.

Since our visit, we have applied for International links funding to allow more teachers (and possibly students in future years!) to be able to visit our Sri Lankan partner school and welcome more of their teachers to Meadowhead in the next 3 years to strengthen our links with this amazing school and culture. So fingers crossed - watch this space!

## **World Maths Day**

This was on 5<sup>th</sup> March and involved more than a million students from around 20,000 schools in 150 countries challenging each other to answer as many mental arithmetic questions as possible – in 60 seconds. All our students were registered on the World Maths Day website and despite some major technical problems on the day (caused by the sheer number of students taking part around the world) a large number of Meadowhead students had a go. Those who did manage to log on and take part seemed to thoroughly enjoy themselves and all took up the challenge with enthusiasm. There was real excitement and a definite competitive atmosphere at times.

All abilities, from Year 7 to Year 11, found it great fun and all seemed genuinely fascinated by the fact that they were playing against similarly aged students from schools as far away as Sri Lanka, Singapore, Hong Kong, Canada or indeed just other schools in the UK. The excitement when they won a round was great to see. The highest score I saw was 30 from Bradley Fisher – 11F, who seemed very pleased with himself. The highest score overall was 39 by William Foulds – 8A. Other high scores included 37 by Emily Allen – 7L, and 33 by Fraser Kelly – 8H.

Overall, more than 180 million questions were correctly answered on the day, of which Meadowhead students answered over 36,000. I think it definitely helped to sharpen up the mental arithmetic skills of those who took part – both students and teachers. It certainly showed me that I need to brush up on my mental subtraction skills! Hopefully we will take part again next year – so keep practising!

## 13 - Unlucky for some?

Sat, Mar 15, saw 24 Meadowhead students, 6 staff and a handful of supporters turn out in the drizzle for what has become a firm favourite in the Meadowhead mathematical calendar – the annual Sheffield Hallam University Pop Maths Quiz.

Some of our Year 11 team had been members of a team in Y8, Y9 and Y10, so were determined to finish their Meadowhead participation with a flourish.

Questions in both age groups (8/9 and 10/11) were challenging - to students and staff - and when there is the added pressure of a time limit mistakes are easily made. As the answers are read out, the cheers indicated another correct answer, and another!

So, did the 13<sup>th</sup> quiz prove unlucky – unfortunately yes! The Y11 team were joint second in their group, beaten by 1 mark. The other three teams acquitted themselves well, but not quite well enough – although the Y8 team were proud to have beaten the Y9 team by 1 mark!



### Forget the recent earthquake, lets make a volcano!!

You can do this at home, but take care ... it gets messy, so get an adult involved!

**You'll need:** Newspaper, flour, salt, cooking oil, water, large bowl, clean plastic drink bottle, baking tray, food colouring (red is best), washing up liquid, baking soda, vinegar.

#### The Steps:

- 1. Mix, 6 cups of flour, 2 cups of salt, 4 tablespoons of cooking oil and 2 cups of water in a large bowl, with your hands until mixture smooth and firm add more water if kneaded (get it !!).
- 2. Place the tray on newspaper (in case tray overflows), stand the drink bottle in the middle of the baking tray and shape the dough around it into a volcano. Keep the bottle mouth free and don't drop any dough down it!
- 3. Fill the bottle with warm water almost to the top, add a few drops of food colouring, squeeze 6 drops of liquid detergent and add 2 tablespoons of baking soda.
- 4. Slowly add vinegar and step back!!

**The science:** vinegar and baking soda have a chemical reaction, which produces carbon dioxide gas. This builds up in the bottle forcing the liquid mixture out of the bottle, simulating a volcano!

## Families for Learning



Help your children improve their thinking skills by asking them the right questions!

Asking the right questions can really help the development of thinking skills. In 1956 Benjamin Bloom classified thinking into 6 areas:

- **Knowledge**-the recall of specific information.
- Comprehension- an understanding of what has been read, seen or heard.
- > Application- converting of abstract content to concrete situations.
- Analysis- comparing and contrasting the content to personal experiences.
- > **Synthesis**-the organization of thoughts, ideas, and information from the content.
- **Evaluation**-the judgment and evaluation of characters, actions, outcome and such like for personal reflection and understanding.

#### Don't worry if you don't know the answers!

Each of these areas has their own question type and attempting to answer such questions will mean that the corresponding thinking skill will be used.

Here are a few examples.

#### Knowledge

What happened when...? How many...?
Who was it that...?

#### Comprehension

Can you describe in your own words...? What do you think happened next...?

#### **Application**

Do you know of another occasion when...? Could this have happened if...?

#### **Analysis**

What was the problem with...? Why did ... changes occur?

#### **Synthesis**

Can you think of a way to...? What would happen if...?

#### **Evaluation**

Is there a better solution to...?
What changes to ...would you recommend?

Try some of these questions with your children. You may even want to encourage them to question you!


## Families for Learning – Progress Day January 2008


