Post 16 Update

It is frequently said nothing ever stands still at Meadowhead and that is certainly true of Post 16. There is a real sense of excitement and anticipation about the school.

In July students have two days of transition activities planned for them at school and the college, as well as two days out in the Peak District where they will be faced with plenty of challenges.

Teachers have been developing their AS courses for the past six months and discussing how they will be able to make full use of our learning platform and ICT facilities to deliver innovative and inspiring lessons. New partnerships have developed and we have been able to draw on a wealth of experience and expertise from amongst our own staff and colleagues in the college and other schools.

We are working on providing students with quality support and guidance throughout Year 12 and Year 13 to enable them to achieve their potential, and have the knowledge, skills and confidence to continue achieving when they progress to university or work. The planned programme will include support with university and employment applications, enrichment activities, tutor time, reviewing and tracking progress towards qualifications, EMA and so on.

The student focus group told us what they wanted and some building alterations have already taken place to provide a Post-16 entrance to the common room. Over the summer ICT work stations will be added to the common room along with a conference table for group work, a comfortable seating area, and tea/coffee making facilities. The Learning Resource Centre will be equipped with further study places, including ICT access.

There is still a lot to do but happily everything is coming together. September 2010 is a very important date for us because it is the start of a new chapter for Meadowhead.

When the Record of Achievement ceremony was first held in 1991 in the old north building we could not have imagined how it would develop over the years into the polished ceremony we have today.


The afternoon began with a celebration of some assorted greatest moments of our Guest of Honour, Tony Currie.

Japanese Website Competition



It has been a very productive and successful year for the Voices of the Students (VOTeS) group. The group was restructured and now includes a Student Chairperson, Deputy Chairperson and Secretary to record the minutes. The group also sets its own agenda and decides on which projects to pursue.

Achievements this year

Improving movement around school:

Students identified that some changes could be made to help movement around school. This was brought to the attention of the VOTeS group who then set up a working party of staff and students. Consultations then took place with the opinions of staff and students being considered. This comprehensive consultation resulted in a set of proposals, each being approved by The Leadership of the school. This project has resulted in students being able to get around school much more easily.

Raising money for Charity:



The VOTeS group also proposed a 'Wear Something Sporty Day' to coincide with Sport Relief. This was a very successful event and raised the fantastic sum of £1625.

The UK Youth Parliament:

A team effort from Ms Marshall, Mr Millar, Mr Barrott, Mrs Henry, Mr Bragg and Mr Gill helped prepare independent candidates, promote the election, cover the electoral process in PSHE lessons and count the votes.

Rebecca Chambers - Race Walking



Rebecca Chambers became Meadowhead's latest national race walking champion when she competed in Victoria Park, London. Becky had taken the bronze medal in the U13 Championship last year and had remained unbeaten in that age group throughout this year. Becky's tactics for the national event were to try to steadily increase her pace and the pressure on her southern rival as the 2km race progressed. That pressure resulted in her opponent dropping off the pace with about 500m to go as the Y7 pupil produced a very even pace race. The 18 second victory reduced her best ever time by 8 seconds with a time of 11.19.

Just one week later, Becky arrived home from her holiday in Guernsey at 5am on the morning of Sheffield's home fixture of the National Young Athletes Race Walking Grand Prix. Despite being tired she produced a high quality performance getting within 3 seconds of her best ever time with 11.22.

This has secured Becky with the 2010 U13 National Grand Prix title with a maximum 200 points.

Becky has also won the South Yorkshire School Championship in 1000m walk, placing her 9th in the British U13 rankings. She is now representing England on the 24th July. Good luck Rebecca!

Y11 Geographers Snowdonia Revision Weekend



On Friday 19th March with their GCSE exams only 3 months away Meadowhead's Year 11 Geographers escaped to their mountain retreat in Snowdonia for a weekend of intense revision and preparation. Basing ourselves at YHA Llanberis we were ideally positioned in the shadow of Yr Wyddfa (Mount Snowdon) and above the former slate mining town of Llanberis. As soon as we arrived the relevance of Geography was rudely brought home to all when, due to the steep incline up to the Hostel, staff and students alike had to leave the coach in the town below and walk up in the dark and the rain.

Once dried, fed and watered a geography quiz served to awaken the students from their Friday night fatigue and rekindle their passion for fieldtrip studying. After a good night's sleep most seemed bright and refreshed next morning when we left on full stomachs for Sygun Copper mine, to crawl into the bowels of the earth and follow the clogged footsteps of miners before us. Here we considered Industrial Geography, the reason for the mine's location, the importance of the product, the working conditions and lastly the factors behind its decline.

Captivated by this nineteenth century underworld industry we crept below once again to see its twentieth century equivalent, Dinorwig Power Station. With 16km of tunnels its construction required 1 million tonnes of concrete, 200,000 tonnes of cement and 4,500 tonnes of steel, making it Europe's largest man-made cavern. On our guided tour we were shown the 6 enormous turbines through which water rushes from the upper to the lower reservoir. The students considered Dinorwig's unique role in supplying sudden surges of power to the national grid at half time in the world cup when we all make a brew. We also assessed the location of such a vast industrial installation in a national park and the attempts that First Hydro have made to reduce their impact.

The weather continued to be kind to us, having rained all the time we were underground, as it brightened up while we lunched in Llanberis. By the time we got to our coastal erosion study at Moelfre on Anglesey we were blessed with beautiful sunshine, perfect for studying on the beach. It was the ideal place to spot the corrosion, corrasion and attrition forms of erosion as well as constructive and deconstructive wave forms, wash and backwash. A short ride on the coach took us to the beautiful Benllech beach where we studied long-shore drift and used the smooth sand to draw the process large-scale.

Drowsy from the sea air we climbed back aboard the coach and arrived back at the hostel for tea. After another hour of intensive revision the students were given the night off. With a large contingent of Meadowhead's finest rugby players among the group, many spent their rest time watching England being outplayed by France in the final game of the Six Nations Championship.

Our last day was spent in Llandudno assessing its coastal management and the hard and soft engineering techniques which have been employed there. Later we rode the tramway up to the top of the Great Orme from where we had a great view to consider the land use in Llandudno. The students sketched all they could see and we went back aboard the tram down to Llandudno. After lunch we met up with our coach and returned to Meadowhead on Sunday evening, all of us tired but enriched by the fresh air and the close encounter with Geography. During this year's festivities, the library will also be hosting Football Commentary Competitions and Treasure Hunts among other events.




Chengdu is famous for being the centre of the Giant Pandas breeding programme and I was fortunate enough to see many of these delightful bears close up. The city also has close links with Sheffield United Football Club and although I handed over the pennant that the Blades asked me to deliver, it didn't sit well with this Wednesdayite!

Children are pretty much the same the world over but, as I have already reported to our own students in assemblies, Chinese pupils work amazingly hard. Their work ethic is something to admire. Their day in school is long – starting at 8.00am and the last lesson finishes at 6.00pm – and they are kept busy in the evening and on Saturdays with a huge range of extra curricular activities. I did not see any examples of poor behaviour in the week I was there, but I'm not surprised by this since I'm sure that the students were just too exhausted to be naughty!

Chinese students are the cleaners of their own schools and with good humour and a smile they made their place gleam and glisten. Perhaps it is not surprising therefore that I saw no litter, no graffiti and evidence of students looking after their premises in a very impressive way.

The Headteacher of School No 20, Mr Wu Lie, will be making his reciprocal visit to us next term and after that it is hoped that more teachers and their students will be offered the opportunity to visit this amazing country for themselves.

They told me I was coming to work for the government – to help my country. Boy, work for the Government sounded like Heaven. The minute I walked into the camp I was confused, scared. I had not seen anything like this before. Other men looked proud to be there, serving Hitler. We got strict instructions and we had to start straight away. Huge carriages, like the ones that deliver cattle, arrived at the camp. I was shocked to see the carriage open to people, packed like sardines. People, hundreds and thousands of people. They filed out all looking as startled as a frightened mouse.

The light pierced the damp, fetid darkness that had been my world for all of what I had guessed was five days. It near blinded me, startling my almost nocturnal eyes. Slowly I rose, tentatively questioning the strength I had. As my retinas adjusted I stumbled out of the cattle truck I had been assigned to. My feet found ground and I was suddenly being pushed onwards by a surge of eager but weak companions. Abruptly we were brought to a halt. SS Army Offices filed out before me. They stood straight and official in front of a huge gate, the words Auschwitz not registering with me. Immediately we were sorted in what appeared a random way. I received a rough shove to the right as I watched my mother and aunt disappear to the left. I never saw them again.

After a while we settled into the daily torture of starvation and humiliation. We had been stripped of all possessions but much more than any material loss they had stripped us of our pride, our family. My soul was barely intact when we entered our second month.

Old people and women were picked straight away to be gassed. The others were made to work hard labour in factories. They weren't even fed properly, only soup and bread. It pained me to watch this. No, it tortured me. I had to be careful of what I said or there would be trouble.

The feeling of isolation was unbelievable. The feeling of being alone in the world like no-one was coming to save you. Perhaps worse than any mental state of distress was my physical state. We worked a sixteen hour day on average with soup and bread twice a day. Sometimes I would use the watery remnants of my soup to wash my face attempting to revive myself. But it was no use.

Some of my neighbours worked in my old job collecting inmates, more and more every day. It appeared to not bother some. I didn't listen to myself anymore. Not my mind, definitely not my heart, just the plain old instructions from the Nazi leaders. My eyes stopped seeing things. I had to accept what was going on like everyone else.

Some of the officers whom we came into daily contact with looked at us in disgust., some took pleasure out of beating our frail, skeleton like bodies. Many looked out of place themselves, as though they too were being tortured. They would hit us, yes, but you could tell it was only from the fear or orders. It did not come from their hearts.

I was not good pals with anyone in particular. I just wanted this to end and so I stayed quiet and did what I was told. The men would talk to me though. At first they were harsh and cruel – as they were trained to be – but as time went by and so many Jews were murdered they started to realise that this was more serious than they thought. The world didn't make sense to me. But I had no voice. Even if I did I would be slaughtered in two seconds. I've got a family to feed.

Many of us were nothing more than ash when the Americans arrived. As we were carried out one by one a fresh wave of humiliation hit us. We saw the looks on their faces when they first laid eyes on us. It was a mixture of horror and pity mingled together. Many of us were naked, skinny enough to count each rib or bone.

A month later doctors told me I was so close to death and although I have physically recovered I know my mind will never truly be at rest. So I ask you, people of the future and the present, next time you think of turning on someone because of their colour, race, faith, anything, just think that you could be next. Some people say it ended that day that the Americans came but it never really ended for us, the Holocaust Survivors.

I only have one message. Don't be a coward like me. Speak out. But I had no choice. My family depend on me. Never let anybody make you do something that you don't want to do. You always have the choice. I hope I don't have to explain how genocide is wrong. I think that speaks for itself. Well I hope it does. To pick on someone because they're different, because you have the power to.

French Exchange to Montaigu



Last October, 24 Y9 and Y10 pupils embarked on the 1st leg of the French Exchange to Montaigu, NW France. Here the pupils met their French partners and spent the week totally immersed in the French culture. They spent a typical day in a French school, visited the famous city of Nantes with its 'Cathédrale St Pierre', ordered their lunch in French, went on the French tram, and had a shopping spree in the shopping centre of Beaulieu.

Our pupils also visited a couple of Primary schools in the area, and discussed the cultural differences between France and England, such as education, food, football and even video games.

On the last day, both French and English pupils spent the day visiting the beautiful coast of Le Croisic, the exciting aquarium and the afternoon ended with a France-England football game on the beach. At the celebration party in the evening, all the host families were thanked and our pupils were congratulated on their manners and behaviour.

CURRICULUM UPDATE 2010-2014



In order to continue to raise attainment at Meadowhead School for all learners and also ensure that there is no plateau of achievement in all the various measures, we are currently in the process of strategically planning the personalised pathways for all students which encompass routes into Post-16 and beyond.

One key aspect is to offer a Meadowhead 'Signature Curriculum' which is accessible to all learners. This will enable all students to access a curriculum which consists of the core subjects of English, Mathematics, Science, Languages, Ethics and Health, Fitness & Well-Being with other experiences of Creative / Performing Arts, History / Geography, Technology / ICT being personalised to students' needs and interests. This will take quite a few years to become fully embedded as will our Post-16 provision.

Some of the key curriculum changes include:

From September 2010 onwards, most students will study two languages in Y7 (currently this happens in Y8) for 3-hours a week and then continue in Y8. Most students will then continue with one language in Y9 (September 2012 onwards), with some students continuing to study both languages in Y9 and beyond. This will allow the current excellent work of Languages within the Primary schools to be fully utilised by the students and therefore enable an even smoother transition of languages learning. From September 2012 onwards, most Y7 students will study two languages in for 4-hours a week and then continue this in Y8.



- Currently all students participate in 2-hours of PE in Y7-Y9 and 1-hour in Y10-Y11. This will change to Health, Fitness & Well-Being for all students for 2-hours a week in Y7-Y9 and also 2-hours in Y10 from September 2011 onwards. This will allow all students to gain a nationally recognised qualification for their work in this area as well as enhancing a clearer understanding of how Health, Fitness and Well-Being forms an integral part of the whole person which will ultimately lead to improved life chances, opportunities and greater quality of life.
- Currently all students participate in PSHE for 1-hour a week in Y7-Y9 and also 1-hour of Life Issues (PSHE / Citizenship / Religious Studies) in Y10-Y11. Religious Studies is currently experienced in Y7-Y9 within the Humanities curriculum for all students. This will be combined into a 2-hour experience of Ethics / Morals for all students from September 2011 onwards in Y7-Y10. This will again allow all students to gain a nationally recognised qualification for their work in this area as well enhancing a clearer understanding of Ethics / Morals which are so needed in society to-day.
- From September 2011 onwards, Y10 students will be following the Meadowhead 'Signature Curriculum' comprising English, Mathematics, Science, Languages, Ethics and Health, Fitness & Well-Being, with a further two subjects based on their needs and interests. This will allow most students to achieve at least 10 qualifications, giving them plenty of scope for further study / training / employment etc post-16 and beyond.
- From September 2012 onwards, some Y9 students will have the possibility of following a more personalised curriculum.
