Congratulations to our Sixth Form Students!




For the first time in over 20 years we are able to announce A Level results for our own Sixth Form students.

We are particularly proud of them because the results were fantastic. 85% have passed three or more A levels with an overall pass rate of 99.8% of all A levels taken. Over 80% of the grades were at A* to C.

The majority of the students are now studying for degrees in University with others in training, apprenticeships and employment.

The staff deserve praise for their hard work. Through excellent teaching and individual support they have ensured that their students have been well prepared and given them the best chance to succeed. There have been outstanding results in English Literature, Mathematics, Languages and Geography, though all subjects can report significant successes.

The partnership with Norton College has proved to be a model of good practice with collaboration between staff working to the best advantage of the students in their care.

Progress Day 2012

On November 15th, we had another very successful Progress Day. Attendance was well over 90% and parents, pupils and staff were all very positive about the outcomes. 98% of parents found the day to be 'effective', with 97% saying that the information they received on the day was 'most useful'.

99% of parents came out of the day saying that they now know 'how to support their son/daughter with their learning'.

Training to access student information online through the SIMS Learning Gateway (SLG) went on all day, with over 400 parents taking advantage of this opportunity. 96% of all parents now say that they will be using the SLG regularly to check on their child's progress.

95% of parents stated that they were happy with the new and extending Sixth Form opportunities being offered by the school.




Olympic Writing Anthology

Carys Hall (Meadowhead student 2004 - 2009) was chosen to be the last torch bearer and to light the cauldron at the City Hall in Barkers Pool on 25th June 2012. Carys, 19, had given more than 115 hours of voluntary time to support the Sheffield Academy of Young Leaders Project since September 2010 and was nominated and chosen because of this. She was also a volunteer at the Paralympics.

Carys said: "It was an absolutely unbelievable experience. I am the luckiest person in the world to have been given the opportunity to do it".

Over 80 teams from Y8-Y13 submitted applications for this year's city-wide enterprise competition, whereby students from schools and colleges across Sheffield set up a small business on a shoe-string start up loan of £25 and competed against each other. The overall winners of the whole competition win a five day 5* trip to a mystery overseas location – which will be revealed in the New Year!

Our internal Dragons' Den selection panel (comprising of myself, Mr Bragg, Mr Eason, Mrs Simpson and special guest Dragon Mr Bacon – design engineer from Trust partner Gripple Ltd), interviewed 40 budding businesses. We selected our final 22 teams with the best quality product ideas and ambition to go forward and enter the Big Challenge 6.



Our teams have made a flying start, and are all geared up to hit the Christmas markets and fairs across the city to maximise their profit margins at this busy time of year. Some have taken orders and made a profit in the first week of trading and are learning a lot about various aspects of how to run a successful business — teamwork, leadership, communication skills, marketing and advertising, sales and production.

All teams are supported with regular after school Big Challenge workshops led by Mrs Silverwood (Enterprise Manager), Mr Eason (Schools Enterprise Champion) and Business Studies students from Sheffield Hallam Universities Venture Matrix team. In addition, each team has their own staff mentor to help offer advice and guide them through this tricky but rewarding process and the skills learnt will undoubtedly enhance their performance in various other subjects in school.

The Trust are currently deciding possible prizes to offer but one of the main motivations could be the opportunity to be published in an anthology. We are also investigating community spaces where we could display the work.

How can parents get involved?

We want parents to be involved either by submitting their own entry or a "paired" piece with their child. For example, when you both write about the same event/place. A community entry form for adult entries is also available.



New venture - 'World of Work Week' Can you help?





On the last day we got guite wet...


After a night of torrential rain and bare* midges (yes midges AND rain) we had to cross some fast flowing rivers.
