Student Investor Challenge

For the last few years, students from Meadowhead School have taken part in the annual Student Investor Challenge. This is the UK's premier national investment competition run by the IFS School of Finance – an organisation whose aim is to promote a better understanding of finance.

Teams of four students aged between 14 and 19 have a virtual £100,000 to invest in stocks and shares and use a dedicated web site to trade shares using real data updated every 15 minutes. The teams compete over a period of 3 months to try to make the biggest profit overall.

Teachers can also take part, although they are not themselves eligible for prizes. There was no danger of me winning any prizes anyway, even though I managed to make a profit for the first time ever – the princely sum of £21.47. One of our student teams, however, performed exceptionally well this year and team 'ILLUMINATI' made an outstanding profit of £22,729. Team members Tom Champion, Alex Murray, Jonathan Saunders and Mark South in Year 11 put in a sterling effort and finished the competition in 15th place overall. This was out of over 9000 teams who entered. They were also 3rd overall in our region – covering North Wales and the Midlands.

The next stage of the competition sees our team taking part in the regional finals in Birmingham at the end of March where they will take part in a one day competition when the 20 teams will each try to prove they know the most about financial matters. The regional finals will involve them working in their team to answer a variety of questions based on economics and finance. The winners from the four regional finals then take part in the national final.

The overall winners of the challenge get a week long, all-expenses paid trip to New York for themselves - and their teacher! There is also £2000 prize money for the school and £200 for each team member. There are also big money prizes for the 2nd and 3rd placed teams.

So there is a lot at stake and the lads have got a big challenge ahead of them. I am looking forward to the regional finals and seeing our team showing the other teams what they know. I am immensely proud of the lads for doing so well and congratulate them for their astute investments and doing so well against some of the top schools in the country.





The competition was fierce, and judges commented on the high quality of the presentations in the KS3 category overall, but in the end KEY2UNLOCK were the only Meadowhead team to get through to the finals. Y9 Battlefields Trip

In February the History department took forty-four Y9 students to the First World War

battlefields in Belgium. The trip was designed to provide the students with first hand experience of the human cost of the First World War. Our expedition began with a visit to the Huge Crater memorial, aptly named as the memorial overlooks a huge crater left behind by a British attack on the German trenches using a devastating mine. The students then had the opportunity to visit various sites including the Yorkshire Trench which is a recently discovered stretch of trench once manned by the South Yorkshire regiment, and the Passencendale museum which gave the students the chance to experience a reconstructed section of an



underground German bunker. 
I really enjoyed the Belgium trip, it meant we could be
