### Meadowhead GCSE Certificates and Awards Presentation Ceremony celebrates 'Coming of Age'

On the 12th November, Meadowhead celebrated a very special anniversary — the 21<sup>st</sup> staging of our GCSE Certificates and Awards Presentation to the students who had completed their Y11 studies in the summer.

It has always been a major highlight in the school's calendar and this was reflected in the large numbers of people who attended. Students, their families, teachers, governors and the wider staff at Meadowhead gathered together to celebrate yet another record year of our GCSE results.

I remember when I was first appointed at Meadowhead, I was invited to the awards evening by a Deputy Head teacher as it had a "real wow factor" and he wasn't wrong. Most schools hold a presentation evening on their school premises but few if any match the grandeur of our celebrations.

Such is the demand to be a part of the evening that our school hall is just not large enough. In order to host the event successfully and enable family and friends to attend we hire the Octagon Centre at the University of Sheffield, a venue capable of holding around 2000. This is funded by the Meadowhead Home & School Association who raise money throughout the year.

This years presentation evening was organised by a committee of five students who were a part of the successful Y11 and are now continuing their studies in Meadowhead 6<sup>th</sup> Form.

They had the equally exciting and daunting role of standing on the large stage that has played host to some of the largest bands in the world such as Oasis and is the venue for the University of Sheffield graduation ceremonies.

They introduced all of the students and gave explanations of each of the awards for progress and exceptional all round performance; something that is a real challenge that has been met by so many of our students.

One of many highlights of the event was the famous interval slideshow featuring fifteen minutes of nostalgia for the year group, focusing on the extra-curricular side of their time at the school since they first arrived in Y7.

This year, our guest speaker was Peter Lauener, the Chief Executive of the Education Funding Agency, part of the DfE, who is responsible for the distribution of an annual budget of £54 billion for the funding of 3 to 19 year old students in Education and Training.

Peter made an inspirational speech that appealed to both the 16 year olds and their families in the audience. The following is an extract from Peter's contribution;

"Nowadays everyone needs to learn and relearn, and the internet, which was only just beginning 40 years ago, has flattened the world – and made it more competitive.

We are in a global competition and we must cherish, celebrate and encourage those who will compete for us in that race. Today, the pool of highly educated people of all ages is roughly equal in Europe, the US and China, but in 2020, a few years from now, China will have more highly educated <u>young</u> people than Europe and the US have young people in total.

The good news is that we in the UK can compete with the best in the world – whatever that is. We are a competitive nation – look at the Olympics last year. And look at some of our outstanding advanced manufacturing industries in which we are world leaders.

But to compete we need to train our minds, we need to collaborate, we need to innovate, we need to be the best that we can be.

So I say to all our students – well done but please make sure you see today as only a marking post on your lifelong journey to be the best you can be."

The evening culminated in a heart–felt speech from our Headteacher Mr Steve Fowler in which he highlighted his pride and honour at leading Meadowhead School and the importance of the positive partnership between families and schools to raise aspiration and achievement for all students. This provided an appropriate seemly finale to the formal part of the presentations and was well received by the audience.

It was a memorable evening and it is down to the generosity of all those who get involved that such a prestigious and memorable event can take place.

Mrs Goodrum and I were delighted to accompany two teams to the award ceremony on December 6th where two of our teams scooped prizes for their efforts so far in the challenge! First time entrepreneurs **EASYBIN** (Jack Roy and Ethan Holloway in Y9) won a **'Highly Commended'** award of £25 for their business, making wooden desktop waste bins for vegetable cuttings or other waste and smaller pencil pots with an innovative interlocking design meaning no glue, nails or staples are required to put the boxes together.

The star of the show however, was Harvey Morton in Y11 deemed as "a serial entrepreneur" according to the Master of Ceremonies, David Grey, (group Managing Director of OSL Group Ltd) who presented him with '1<sup>st</sup> prize' of £150 for his company HARVEY MORTON IT SUPPORT, which offers a range of IT support to customers across Sheffield. Harvey is now in his third year of running his own business in the Big Challenge, starting out as a humble entrepreneur selling key-rings back in 2011. Harvey has thrived in the Big Challenge ever since, finding and developing his passion for IT and making money through starting up his own website to promote his business. He has also developed mobile phone apps for corporate clients, set up new home computers, iPads and i-Tunes libraries for clients for a reasonable price, as well as generating revenue from selling advertising space on his own website and social media and through promoting products sold Amazon via his successful website.

## New Developments for Meadowhead Sixth Form and the Sheffield College


Our Sixth Form will be offering more courses based entirely at Meadowhead from next year.

The college has been successful in securing government funding to support a £15.6 million investment in new facilities. Consequently, the Norton College building on Dyche Lane will close in September 2015. A level staff, courses and students based at Norton College will continue and relocate to Meadowhead for 2015 or Hillsborough College in the north of the city or Peaks College in the south of the city.

We are pleased and proud of the working partnership that we have developed in recent years with the college, increasing the options for students in this part of the city. Some of our A Level students already spend part of their week being taught at both Meadowhead and at Norton College. A Level courses delivered in partnership with Norton College are continuing as normal this year and next. We guarantee that all students who start A levels in September 2014 at Meadowhead and Norton College will be able to continue those courses at Meadowhead full time in their second year.

We have also been in discussion with the college with a view to continuing our A level partnership in the future, after Norton closes. We have valued the way in which the close working relationship afforded by the partnership means we can assure all our students are well-catered for at the age of 16, not just those studying A levels. The range and quality of vocational courses available means that everyone has the possibility of a bright future.

#### Our Wednesday Enrichment Programme...

As part of the sixth form A Level programme, all students have the opportunity every Wednesday to be part of an 'enrichment activity'. An enrichment activity is anything that they do out of lesson time that contributes positively to their own personal development. Evidence of involvement in enrichment activities is invaluable when completing university or job applications, and it will also be of great benefit to show skills and attributes in preparation for working life. This will enable our sixth form students to leave with added skills, knowledge and experience when pursuing their career paths.



The students have two options. They can choose to be involved in school activities or take a work placement externally. Students may also choose to do a bit of both within their two years which will further broaden their experience!

#### In School activities

A comprehensive schedule has been created in school for students to get involved which includes:

#### Science & Engineering

"Students have been looking at a broad range of science topics, including space exploration, fundamental chemical analysis, DNA and life, and the history of science. The Programme aims to give students a broader understanding of science

outside of the curriculum and in different contexts. Students have found these sessions interesting and thought provoking and hope that they will strengthen their applications for further study"

"In cultural studies, students consider and discuss films, books and art from across history and from around the world. So far sessions have included such diverse texts as Slaughterbouse Five (Vonnerut), Guernica (Picasso), Top

Slaughterhouse Five (Vonnegut), Guernica (Picasso), Top Girls (Churchill), Catch-22 (Heller), Pocahontas (Disney), Things Fall Apart (Achebe) and Song 2 (Blur). The groups have welcomed guest speakers from Meadowhead School and Sheffield University"

*"We have learned about key events in 20<sup>th</sup> Century European History, from the fall of the Berlin Wall to the Spanish Civil War. Students have also used Eurotalk* 

software to begin independently learning new languages including Arabic and Greek. Next term we plan to investigate different career paths which language learning can open up for us"

"Maths Enrichment involves looking at the history and development of Mathematics, at the techniques and discoveries from around the world that have led to Maths in its modern form, and at the various applications of the subject in the real world. We also do puzzles"

"The HFWB department have opened the fitness suite for 2 hours on a Wednesday afternoon. Students can work out at their own leisure, choosing between a cardio session,

weights, circuit training or pushing themselves to the limit by attempting an Insanity workout to improve their fitness and wellbeing.

"Students learn about all aspects of running a small business enterprise through various sessions to enable them to develop key transferrable skills that will be extremely valua-

## **Work Placements**

Some University courses or job applications **require** work experience as part of their course or job. So, students also have the opportunity to be out on work placement every Wednesday as an alternative. This provides them with 'hands on' experience, knowledge of the working environment and builds up the valuable skills they need.

## And they just keep coming . . .

At Meadowhead School, the importance of good attendance is always stressed. If you come to school you will make progress and all the facts and figures bear this out. It is common sense that if you aren't in lessons, you won't be learning. It is also said that it isn't easy to force a full grown teenager to go to school. They have to want to - they must recognise the importance of education, enjoy their lessons, feel safe at school and generally feel that school is the place that they want to be.

Meadowhead School must be doing something right - for yet another year our attendance figures have risen. Last year our attendance was **95.1%** - well above the national average. In the whole of 2012-2013, **66.8%** of pupils (1,105) had over **95%** attendance. **8.6%** of pupils (142) had **100%** attendance for the full year. No wonder our exam results keep rising! You have to be "in it to win it" and our pupils certainly are!



The target for the school this year is **95.5%**. Can we achieve it? Of course we can! We know most of our students are aiming for **100%** - certificates and awards all round!

Last half term the attendance was **96.1%** and **48.7%** of pupils (803) achieved **100%** attendance and **73.6%** (1,214) had over **95%** - figures that easily beat the figures for the same time last year.

We are very grateful to all families who work closely with the school to ensure this trend continues. Miss Bradley, our Education Welfare Officer (EWO) works closely with those families that occasionally need our support and her input is invaluable. A great help has been that the majority of parents have supported the school by not taking holidays in term time and by ensuring that students return to school after illness, at the earliest opportunity. Many thanks to you all.

#### Did you know . . .

From September 2013, the Government has announced significant amendments to legislation surrounding holidays in term time. A new law gives no entitlement to parents to take their child on holiday during term time and so unauthorised term-time holidays may result in each parent being issued with a Penalty Notice - a fine issued by, and payable to, Sheffield City Council.

## **Manchester University Science Trip**

Y11 students with a working at grade of A\* in physics and chemistry GCSE were invited to the University of Manchester Materials Science department. Students took part in a team 'build a beam' challenge experienced what a day might be like at University and learned about the exciting careers a degree in Materials Science can lead to.

Students were challenged to design and manufacture a beam that had the greatest Young's Modulus to weight ratio using a variety of materials and tools. In the afternoon the beams were tested to destruction using a 3 point testing machine, and students had to present their project to an audience of fellow scientists.

Congratulations to Team Disaster Beam who won a prize for the best presentation and to Team Toblerone for the best beam.

## Congratulations to all the students who completed and achieved the Bronze Award

In November, Meadowhead School held its first DofE 'Evening of Celebration' to present certificates in recognition of the dedication, hard work and enthusiasm shown by our students throughout the DofE challenge.

There were stunning and moving performances from Olivia Martin and Eleanor Wildgoose on the piano, Rebecca Lee sang a number from 'Cats' whilst Bronte Hobson demonstrated her ukulele skills as she accompanied Holly Parker singing; showing that *Meadowhead students have definitely Got Talent!* 



The journey for 59 eager students began in January 2013 with weekly training sessions, of first aid, map reading and camp craft skills, (all essential preparation for the expedition weekends). Students then took on new skills such as learning Italian, dog training, playing guitar, ukulele, piano and singing. Also physical challenges were also included, including football, zumba, gym, swimming, horse riding and walking. The volunteering section enabled students to provide a service within the community. They assisted with mentoring, homework support, Boccia for disabled, church steward, fundraising events, helping the elderly and children with baking and craft skills.

The expeditions took place over two weekends, a practice and the qualifier. In order to be successful, the DofE 20 conditions have to be fulfilled which includes 6 hours of planned activity, walking, teamwork, preparing and cooking a hot meal and camping.

Sue Johnson our development officer from the DofE centre said, "It was an absolute pleasure to assist with the Expedition training for the Meadowhead students last year. The young people were enthusiastic, polite and very keen to learn.

I was most impressed with the Volunteering activities the young people chose; they showed great maturity & confidence in arranging these. Speaking to the young people they appeared to enjoy this section immensely.

We are very proud of the achievements by the Meadowhead students & congratulate them on their DofE success."

## Eco Greenhouse Project 2012-2013



Just six top teams from Secondary schools across the city were then chosen to attend the finals to present their business plan to a top panel of judges at Barclay's Bank on 9<sup>th</sup> December to compete for overall 1st and 2nd prize. 
