# Morocco 2014

By the time you read this many things would have happened. Exams will have been completed, the World Cup will be won (hopefully by England), Andy Murray may have retained his Wimbledon crown and 7 intrepid Y12 and Y13 students will be back from an eye opening and challenging expedition to the High Atlas Mountains of North Africa!

The aims of the expedition are twofold. Firstly to ascend North Africa's highest peak named Jebel Toubkal with an altitude of over 4000m (more than 4 times higher than England's highest) and secondly to immerse ourselves in Berber culture and help a Berber community project in the mountain village of Asni.

### Cantabria 2014






### Secrets of an Author Visit

After 30 years as a Maths teacher at Meadowhead and Jordanthorpe Schools we say goodbye to Mike Jones and wish him well in his retirement.



Thank you Mr Jones for all your work in the Maths faculty and as a Maths teacher over the years. Enjoy your retirement




The trip was intense throughout: early starts, late finishes, hours of
