Forced Marriage

- Forced marriage is not restricted to one particular community.
- There have been cases involving families from the Middle East, Europe and Africa.
- There are over 1000 cases of forced marriage in the UK every year.
- There were 177 cases of Forced Marriage in Birmingham in 1 year.
- There is a strict distinction between forced and arranged marriage THEY ARE NOT THE SAME THING.
- Forced marriage is carried out without the consent of the child and involves pressure or coercion.
- No religion agrees with forced marriage.
