<u>Confirmation – Why is it important for some</u> <u>Christians?</u>

- They become a full member of the Church
 - At their baptism they are welcomed into the Church, but at confirmation they become an adult and can take part in Church life.
- They renew their baptismal vows for themselves
 - At a baptism parents and godparents make promises for babies about following Jesus. At confirmation they have the chance to make promises themselves in front of the community.

✓ They receive the gifts of the Holy Spirit

 At an important time in their lives they are given special gifts to keep them strong and help through a time of change.

Marriage

The couple say **marriage vows (promises)** to each other, which are special promises. These show Christian beliefs about how the couple are to remain faithful to each other no matter what happens.

The minister announces that the man and woman are now husband and wife, and says, "What God has brought together let no man separate." He then says to the groom, "You may kiss the bride."

Islam:

Many Muslims have an arranged marriage where parents choose the suitor. They do this as Prophet Muhammad had an arranged marriage. Muslims are expected to get married, it is an important part of their faith. <u>Bar Mitzvah</u> means 'Son of the Commandment'. It is the point at which a boy becomes an adult member of the Jewish community. It is part of ancient Jewish culture which has been practiced for thousands of years.

He will wear a <u>tallit</u> and learn to put on <u>tefillin</u>. Being Bar Mitzvah does not depend on having a ceremony, but most boys do as it is a big celebratory occasion for families and the Jewish community.

The Bar Mitzvah takes place on the <u>Shabbat</u> (Sat) after the boy's 13th birthday. He has to learn <u>Hebrew</u> and practise reading the portion of the <u>Torah</u> that he has to read during the service. A <u>rabbi</u> will help him to do this.
