David Crystal Lecture

On Friday 28th February a group of our A level English Language students attended a charity lecture given by world renowned linguist Professor David Crystal at the University of Sheffield.



The students learned about the latest research developments in the study of Child Language Acquisition, which is a key component of the A level syllabus.

All the money raised from the lecture was donated to the I CAN charity which supports children with communication difficulties. After the talk, some of our students were able to meet Professor Crystal, who has written over 120 books on the English language.

SAY iT at Meadowhead

Based in Sheffield, the charity provides practical support around LGBT+ life, sexual health, HIV and mental wellbeing. They ran sessions with all our Y8s, starting with an interactive agree/disagree spectrum task which really got us to think.

One of the

questions asked us if Meadowhead was a safe space for



LGBT+ students, and most of us agreed it was, which was pleasing to see. This was followed by a "BINGO" task where we had to match key words with their definitions. Some of these words were new to us such as 'passing' and 'cisgender'. It was important to understand the different terms used and know that not everyone likes to identify with a 'he or she'. After that we watched a video, which showed how LGBT+ members could feel and how one person being an ally could make a massive impact on an LGBT+ student's life. For the last 20 minutes we discussed how we can improve PRIDE around our school. We came up with ideas such as

It is really important to support anyone who feels like they can't come out as this can be a very difficult time for them.

Pi Day



14th March is known as Pi Day (can you figure out why?) so in the week leading up to it at Meadowhead we celebrated Pi Week.

Various activities took place across several subjects

- In maths students were given a variety of circular objects and had to discover pi themselves
- In science students learnt about Albert Einstein (he was born on Pi day)
- In English students may have created a Pi poem
- In music some students listened to Kate Bush sing pi!

Also form groups were challenged to learn as many digits of pi as they could – the winner was a member of Y9 who could recall pi to an astonishing 225 places.

STEM Club - 3D Printing

The Y8/9 STEM Club have been learning all about 3D printing this term in a project supported by Rolls-Royce and The Royal Academy of Engineering.

The students have experimented with the future of gastronomy by 3D printing chocolate houses, recreated the Eiffel Tower with 3D printing pens and used software to design and print their own 3D creations.

At the start of March Mr O'Brien and Mr Dutton took 20 Y12/13 students to Geneva, Switzerland. The purpose of the visit was to take part in a tour around the world famous CERN - The European Organization for Nuclear Research. Physicists and engineers at CERN use the world's largest and most complex scientific instruments to study the basic constituents of matter -

fundamental particles. Subatomic particles are made to collide together at close to the speed of light. The process gives us clues about how the particles interact, and provides insights into the fundamental laws of nature. Scientists at CERN want to advance the boundaries of human knowledge by delving into the smallest building blocks of our universe.

Whilst at CERN students got the chance to speak to CERN scientists and ask them guestions. We also experienced a traditional Swiss fondue restaurant, a wet cruise on Lake Geneva, visited various museums and explored Geneva's old quarter with stunning view from Saint Peters cathedral. Students had an unforgettable once in a lifetime trip and were exemplary in their behaviour.

Italy

Our Geography students' volcano study visit to Italy in February was a huge success with all 42 students that visited the bay of Naples, enjoying themselves completely as they explored this iconic region.

Out and About



The first day took us to the Island of Capri, famous for its

picturesque coastline, this tiny island displayed perfect examples of coastal features as we explored the perimeter on one of the calmest laser boat rides taken on the trip.



Day two took us to the summit of Vesuvius where the views and the wind swept us off our feet. The awe-

inspiring views of the crater at the summit of the volcano, a 300m deep, 600m wide chasm reminded students of the dangers that volcanoes pose as it continued to release steam from cracks in the rock.



We proceeded to explore the ruins of Pompeii, students and staff gained the opportunity to witness the exact moment people lost their lives in a pyroclastic flow that destroyed the town in 79AD and to see the excellently preserved buildings, roads and even bread. After grabbing some lunch, we took to the streets of Sorrento, giving students the opportunity to explore the town and have some free time to buy souvenirs.

Friday took us along the stunningly beautiful Amalfi coast and to the town of Ravello. Students were happy that the coach driver did most of the work for us, delivering us to our first stop, Amalfi by the way of cliff side roads. The weather created the perfect backdrop to the incredible clifftop views.

In Amalfi, students had the opportunity to explore the town and visit the cathedral, which took pride of place in the town centre. A quick stop in Ravello to discover the views over the some beautiful V shape valleys before returning to Sorrento.

We would like to thank all of the students who represented their school and community excellently and the staff who supported the students with the trip. Until next year - Ciao!
