

## KEY VOCABULARY

Theme - A reoccurring idea in a play.

Angel and Devil - A drama convention used to explore character dilemma. The angel represents the moral choice, the devil represents the wrong choice. Both try to persuade the character to side with them.

Exaggeration - Being big and over the top with your voice and movements in performance.

Characterisation - Making your body and voice appropriate for the role you are playing.

Spoken Language - The words a character speaks on stage.

Tableaux - A freeze frame or still image. Often used in theatre to draw the audiences attention to a key moment.

Role Play - Imagining the perspective of a character and applying characterisation to speak and react as the character would in a given situation.

# DR FAUSTUS

Dr Faustus is a 16<sup>th</sup> century play written by playwright Christopher Marlowe. It centres around a character called Faustus who, growing bored of university life and hard work, chooses to sell his soul to the devil in exchange for 24 years of wishes. Upon his death in 24 years time, Faustus's soul will go to hell. Faustus discovers that his wishes are not all he wants and he increasingly feels tricked by the devil. The play ends with Faustus being taken to hell. There are many opportunities in the play for Faustus to repent and ask for forgiveness from God, but he chooses not to. The play fits into the moral genre of the 16<sup>th</sup> century whereby theatre was used as a tool of reminding people about right and wrong or good and evil. In 16<sup>th</sup> century England, religion was unquestioned and there was an unshaken belief in God, Heaven and Hell. People feared going to Hell and Dr Faustus served as a reminder about why. It can be understood today as an early example of horror.
